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DID YOU KNOW?



School was horrible with PANDAS. I can't talk about it

A viral or bacterial infection can affect the brain and cause the onset of both psychiatric and physical symptoms in children and young people (CYP)

PANS PANDAS UK is supporting around 7000 families reporting the onset of neuropsychiatric symptoms in their CYP

Some Local Authorities are unaware of recent developments leading to significant challenges addressing the conditions

Conditions are often misdiagnosed leading to delay in treatment and inappropriate labelling of needs

There is general acceptance that delayed intervention can increase risk of long-term impacts

Prompt diagnosis facilitates faster symptom resolution, enabling a quicker return to school

WHY IS THIS UPDATE NEEDED?



Local Authorities may be supporting an increasing number of children and young people with suspected or diagnosed PANS and PANDAS.

All professionals across health, education and social care should be aware of the conditions.

Significant developments have recently taken place, of which Local Authorities may not yet be fully abreast.

These developments supersede previous understanding that the conditions are not accepted by the NHS.

This short overview will give a brief update and signpost to further information.

WHAT ARE PANS AND PANDAS?





PANS

Paediatric Acute-onset Neuropsychiatric Syndrome

PANDAS

Paediatric Autoimmune Neuropsychiatric Disorders Associated with Streptococcal Infections

- As with **medical conditions** which affect both physical and mental health, a post infectious and/or immune cause targeting the brain may be implicated.
- Triggered by common infections (for example strep throat, chickenpox, or influenza) and can only be diagnosed by a medical professional.
- Conditions mainly affect children, and onset usually happens between 3 and 13 years.
- PANS however can also affect adults, and symptoms do not suddenly remit at 16. Conditions are usually relapsing and remitting, (symptoms go up and down) and an exacerbation of symptoms is known informally as a flare.

Some key developments

September 2023 - Maria Caulfield, then Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Health, acknowledged PANS and PANDAS as NHS-recognised diseases in a Parliamentary debate

November 2024 - Meeting with the Department for Health and Social Care. Baroness Merron, the Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State for Health and clinical directors from NHS England commended the work of the charity and agreed to enabling further meetings

December 2024 - Letter from the Department for Health and Social Care (DHSC) acknowledging their position

January 2025 - All Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) reformed with Chair Wendy Chamberlain MP

January 2025- Letter from the APPG to the Education Secretary Rt Hon Bridget Phillipson.

PANS PANDAS UK Manifesto and Early Day Motion in Parliament



Children and young people with undiagnosed and/or untreated PANS or PANDAS may struggle to attend school, experience significant decline in their cognitive and physical functioning and experience severe psychiatric symptoms.

PANS PANDAS Steering Group Workstreams



Research group

Application for a UK-wide surveillance study to BPSU (British Paediatric Surveillance Unit) and CAPSS (Child and Adolescence Psychiatry Surveillance System) has been submitted. Subsequent research will centre around early phase treatment and will map out service development.

The PANS PANDAS Steering group is overseeing four integrated and parallel working groups across health, social care and education

Clinical Guidelines Development Group

Work commenced in Spring 2024 to develop a set of Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health (RCPCH) accredited UK clinical guidelines.

Education, social care & health group

Work is underway to create guidance and a position statement for Local Authorities to support children and young people with diagnosed or suspected PANS or PANDAS.

Service Pathway Specification Group

Will follow on from the guidelines development group and assess whether a specialist service will be commissioned through NHSE, or if there may be a need for enhanced clinical pathways for local and tertiary multidisciplinary teams (MDT).

How do PANS and PANDAS affect children and young people in Education?



Children and young people living with PANS and PANDAS can abruptly go from doing well in school to experiencing a wide range of difficulties. These can include:

developing obsessive thoughts and behaviours, tics, anxiety, age regression, emotional dysregulation, handwriting deterioration, executive functioning difficulties, sensory needs, eating issues and problems sleeping.

PERCEPTION OF NEED SHAPES THE SUPPORT



PANS and PANDAS have overlapping symptomology with many other conditions and neurodivergences. CYP can also have multiple longterm conditions.



Families report that overlap, coupled with limited awareness is contributing to delays in treatment, inequitable support, unintended harm and long-term poor outcomes for children and young people.

There is general acceptance that delayed intervention can increase risk of long-term impacts.

PANDAS is recognised by the World Health Organisation (WHO)


Two entries under the ICD11 code

Diagnosis is reflected in EHCP tribunals



Recent High Court Judicial Review found that a Local Authority failed to provide the special educational support (section F) required in a child's EHCP (Education Health and Care Plan) EOTIS package. Reaffirms that Local Authorities are under 'absolute duty' to secure special education provision.

In relation to PANS, the case highlights the importance of:

- needs linked to the diagnosis of PANS being recognised and met
- the detrimental impact on the child when these needs are not met

PANS (and PANDAS) are medical diagnoses and should be included in Section C of an EHCP.

The Claimant is currently 11 years old. He is a disabled child who has diagnoses of Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder ("ADHD"), Autistic Spectrum Disorder ("ASD") and an immune mediated component to a neurobehavioral disorder known as Paediatric Acute-onset Neuropsychiatric Syndrome ("PANS").

Key Messages





The purpose of this information is to support **Local Authorities**' understanding of the current position and status of PANS and PANDAS in England. **PANS and PANDAS are** recognised by NHS England

- There is general acceptance that delayed intervention can increase risk of long-term impacts. More research is needed.
- Systemic and integrated streams of work across health, social care and education are underway in the UK.
- PANS and PANDAS have overlapping symptomology with many other conditions and neurodivergences. Symptoms can easily be misconstrued leading to a delay in treatment, trauma and poorer outcomes.
- Whilst the research and information about PANS and PANDAS is evolving, all professionals who are supporting children and young people with PANS and PANDAS have a responsibility to access further information, training and resources in the interim.
- PANS and PANDAS are medical conditions. Professionals have a duty of care and must adhere to the relevant legislation.
